#### 942a Reading from the Old Testament

942a-1 Wisdom 13:1-9

'If they could investigate the world, how did they fail to find the Lord of these things?'

A reading from the Book of Wisdom.

- All men who were ignorant of God were foolish by nature; and they were unable from the good things that are seen to know him who exists, nor did they recognise the artisan while paying heed to his works;
- but they supposed that either fire or wind or swift air or the circle of the stars or turbulent water or the luminaries of heaven were the gods that rule the world.
- If through delight in the beauty of these things people assumed them to be gods, let them know how much better than these is their Lord, for the author of beauty created them.
- And if people were amazed at their power and working, let them perceive from them how much more powerful is he who formed them.
- For from the greatness and beauty of created things comes a corresponding perception of their Creator.
- Yet these people are little to be blamed, for perhaps they go astray while seeking God and desiring to find him.
- For as they live among his works they keep searching, and they trust in what they see, because the things that are seen are beautiful.
- Yet again, not even they are to be excused;
- for if they had the power to know so much that they could investigate the world, how did they fail to find sooner the Lord of these things?

### 942b Reading from the New Testament

942b-1 Colossians 1:15-20

'All things were created through him and for him.'

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Colossians.

- Christ Jesus is the image of the invisible God, the first born of all creation.
- For by him all things were created, in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or authorities—all things were created through him and for him.
- And he is before all things, and in him all things hold together.
- And he is the head of the body, the Church.

  He is the beginning, the first born from the dead, that in everything he might be pre-eminent.
- For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell,
- and through him to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, making peace by the blood of his cross.

During Lent, one of the following acclamations is used instead of Alleluia as a response to the verse before the Gospel:

- a. Glory and praise to you, O Christ.
- b. Glory to you, O Christ, Wisdom of God the Father.
- c. Glory to you, O Christ, you are the Word of God.
- d. Glory to you, O Christ, Son of the living God.
- e. Praise and honour to you, Lord Jesus.
- f. Praise to you, O Christ, King of eternal glory.

How many are your works, O LORD! In wisdom you have made them all.

942d-2 1 Chronicles 29:11d, 12b

Yours is the kingdom, O LORD; you rule over all.

942e-1 Matthew 6:24-34

'Do not be anxious about tomorrow.'

★ A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew.

At that time: Jesus said to his disciples,

- 'No one can serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money.
- 'Therefore I tell you, do not be anxious about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, nor about your body, what you will put on.

  Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing?
- Look at the birds of the air:
  they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns,
  and yet your heavenly Father feeds them.
  Are you not of more value than they?
- And which of you by being anxious can add a single hour to his span of life?
- And why are you anxious about clothing?

  Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow: they neither toil nor spin,
- yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these.
- But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which today is alive and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you, O you of little faith?
- Therefore do not be anxious, saying, "What shall we eat?" or "What shall we drink?" or "What shall we wear?"
- For the Gentiles seek after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them all.
- But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added to you.
- 'Therefore do not be anxious about tomorrow, for tomorrow will be anxious for itself.

  Sufficient for the day is its own trouble.'

♣ A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew.

At that time:

- When Jesus got into the boat, his disciples followed him.
- And behold, there arose a great storm on the sea, so that the boat was being swamped by the waves; but he was asleep.
- And they went and woke him, saying, 'Save us, Lord; we are perishing.'
- And he said to them,

  'Why are you afraid, O you of little faith?'

  Then he rose and rebuked the winds and the sea, and there was a great calm.
- And the men marvelled, saying, 'What sort of man is this, that even winds and sea obey him?'
