

Easter Sunday Year A – 12th April 2020

Introduction

Today is the greatest Celebration of the year for us. It's Easter Sunday!
We celebrate because Jesus has risen from the dead- Alleluia!

Make the Sign of the Cross – a sign of the love God has for us.

Light the candles on the table next to the Lectionary. An adult lights the candles).

Penitential Act

Ask the children to think about how they have behaved in the past week. Especially when our daily routines are different just now. Have you shown patience to those around you? Have you been kind and helpful even when you don't feel like it and it's difficult?

Lead the children in singing the "Sorry Song".

We are sorry, *(To the Tune of Frere Jacques)*
Truly sorry,
Heal us Lord,
In Your love,
Help us to do better,
Help us to be kinder.
Forgive us,
Forgive us.

Gloria (Sung) *Before singing the Gloria remind the Children of the importance of it today. We have not sung it at all during Lent and return to it as it is a reminder to us of our Lord's coming and rising from the dead.*

Glory to God in the highest,
and peace to His people on earth.
Lord God, heavenly King,
Almighty God and Father,
we worship You, we give You thanks,
we praise You for Your glory.
Lord Jesus Christ,
only Son of the Father,
Lord God, Lamb of God,

You take away the sin of the world:
have mercy on us;
You are seated at the right hand of the Father:
receive our prayer.
For You alone are the Holy One,
You alone are the Lord,
You alone are the Most High,
Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit,
in the glory of the Father.

All stand to welcome the Gospel singing the **Gospel Acclamation:**

(Sing to the tune of 'If You're Happy and You Know It')

Alleluia, alleluia, praise the Lord,
Alleluia, alleluia, praise the Lord,

As we listen to the story,
let us praise him for his glory.
Alleluia, alleluia, praise the Lord.

Gospel

*Matthew 28:1-10 From Sunday Book of Readings
The Lectionary Adapted for Children P.45*

A reading from the Holy Gospel According to St. Matthew

All say "Glory to You Oh Lord" while making a cross on your forehead, on your lips and on your heart.

"On the first day of the week, very early in the morning, Mary Magdalene and, another woman named Mary went to the tomb where Jesus was buried. Suddenly there was a big earthquake and an angel of God came down from heaven. The angel rolled the stone away from in front of the tomb and sat on it. The angel was wearing bright white clothes that were shining like lightning.

The soldiers who were guarding the tomb were very frightened, and they fell down like they were dead! Then the angel said to the women,

“Don’t be afraid. I know you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. But he isn’t here. He has been raised from the dead, just as he said he would. Come and see the place where his body was laid. Now hurry and tell his disciples about this. Say to them,

“Jesus has risen from the dead. He is going to Galilee where you will see him.”

So the women hurried away. They were filled with joy, but they were also a little afraid. Suddenly Jesus was standing in front of them . He said, “Peace!” The women fell down and hugged his feet and worshipped him. Then Jesus said, “Don’t be afraid. Go and tell my disciples that they must go to Galilee where they will see me.”

The Gospel of the Lord

All say : Praise to You Lord Jesus Christ

Lead a Discussion on the Gospel

Today we celebrate Easter- ask the children what they think of when they hear the word Easter. (They may make reference to eggs, this is a good chance to remind them that these represent the stone of the tomb that Jesus rolled away)

Explain that Easter is the most important celebration in our Church because of what we heard in today’s Gospel.

Remind them of the events leading up to Easter. On Holy Thursday Jesus celebrated the Last Supper and left us with the gift of Priesthood and his own Body and Blood in the form of the Sacraments of the Most Holy Eucharist.

On Good Friday, Jesus took on the sins of the world and was crucified and died. This filled us with great sadness.

In today’s Gospel we hear how Mary Magdalene went to the tomb and saw that the stone had been taken away? (How do you think she felt and reacted? Fear, worry, denial, panic)

Ask the children what Mary Magdalene did next? (She went to get help, just as we do when we are in need or unsure of what to do)

John and Simon-Peter also went to look in the Tomb and in disbelief saw that the body of Jesus was not there. When they looked around, they started to understand what was going on. They realised he had shown that he was the Son of God because he had risen from the dead!

When Jesus rose from the dead, he overcame death as it once was for us all. By his rising he has allowed us to enjoy eternal life with his father in Heaven. His dying, destroyed death and that is why Easter is the greatest celebration of all.

What kind of things can you do at Easter to show your great appreciation to Jesus for what he did for us? (The main thing you can do is show his love to others by the way you act and live your lives every single day. Trust in him and spread his love with everyone you meet. Pray for those in need, especially the sick and lonely this year)
