





Kingdom of Heaven Cards


Jane was out shopping with her mum. She saw a toy that she really wanted. She had seen the advert on TV and one of her friends had gotten it for their birthday.

What should Jane have done?





Teacher Notes on the Advent Wreath

The symbolism of the Advent wreath is beautiful. The wreath is made of various evergreens, signifying continuous life. Even these evergreens have a traditional meaning which can be adapted to our faith: The laurel signifies victory over persecution and suffering; pine, holly, and yew, immortality; and cedar, strength and healing. Holly also has a special Christian symbolism: The prickly leaves remind us of the crown of thorns, and one English legend tells of how the cross was made of holly. The circle of the wreath, which has no beginning or end, symbolizes the eternity of God, the immortality of the soul, and the everlasting life found in Christ. Any pine cones, nuts, or seedpods used to decorate the wreath also symbolize life and resurrection. All together, the wreath of evergreens depicts the immortality of our soul and the new, everlasting life promised to us through Christ, the eternal Word of the Father, who entered our world becoming true man and who was victorious over sin and death through His own passion, death, and resurrection.

The four candles represent the four weeks of Advent. A tradition is that each week represents one thousand years, to sum to the 4,000 years from Adam and Eve until the Birth of the Saviour. Three candles are purple and one is rose. The purple candles in particular symbolize the prayer, penance, and preparatory sacrifices and goods works undertaken at this time. The rose candle is lit on the third Sunday, Gaudete Sunday, when the priest also wears rose vestments at Mass; Gaudete Sunday is the Sunday of rejoicing, because the faithful have arrived at the midpoint of Advent, when their preparation is now half over and they are close to Christmas. The progressive lighting of the candles symbolizes the expectation and hope surrounding our Lord's first coming into the world and the anticipation of His second coming to judge the living and the dead.

The light again signifies Christ, the Light of the world. Some modern day adaptations include a white candle placed in the middle of the wreath, which represents Christ and is lit on Christmas Eve. Another tradition is to replace the three purple and one rose candles with four white candles, which will be lit throughout Christmas season.




The Annunciation

The Visitation



With her husband Joseph and the infant Jesus, Mary became the mother of the Holy Family.




The Shepherds in the Fields

The Angels Bring the Good News.


After the angel told the shepherds the good news, a choir of angels appeared in the sky singing out the good news,

"Glory to God in the highest heaven, and peace on earth to those with whom he is pleased."




Template for Christmas Angel


- 1. Cut out the large circle

- 6. Now decorate the facing portion of the wings.










Shepherd Template

Instructions for Shepherd & Sheep Template

Instructions - Shepherd

You will need:

- A cardboard tube or stiff cardboard formed in a cylindrical shape
- A copy of the shepherd template on thin card
- Glue
- Scissors
- Art materials
 - 1. Colour the pieces as appropriate and cut them out.
 - 2. Glue the large rectangular piece around a cardboard tube.
 - 3. Glue the rectangle (belt) around the middle of the tube.
 - 4. Glue the head onto the top of the tube and the arms on the sides.
 - 5. Fold the tabs of the feet and glue them under the tube to make a 3D effect.
 - 6. Glue the sheep into the shepherd's arms or onto the front of the tube near his feet.

Instructions - Sheep

You will need:

- A copy of the sheep template on thin card. Remember to place the dotted line on a folded sheet of cardboard to give a 3D effect.
- Cotton wool
- Glue
- Scissors
- Art materials
 - 1. Colour the face and the legs and cut the sheep out.
 - 2. Draw and colour eyes and ears.
 - 3. Glue on cotton wool over the body,
