


Called by Name

I remember my Baptism whenever I make the sign of the cross.





The Sacrament of Reconciliation Booklet 1

Lesson Aims

- To reinforce to the children that God loves them, he is our Father and he wants his children to love him.
- To encourage the children to reflect on the goodness within themselves.
- To highlight the positive qualities each child has.
- To help the children to reflect on their baptism and see that they are now preparing to make their second sacrament.
- To help the children to understand what First Reconciliation means and get them thinking about right and wrong and sin.

1 "<u>Called by Name</u>" worksheet. 20 minutes approx.

Remind the children of the Sacrament of Baptism, that when they were babies their parents wanted them to be part of God's Christian family. God calls us all to be good - saints in fact!! He wants us to shine like the stars. Emphasise their uniqueness.

- Encourage the children to put up their hands to say what they are good at, i.e. their talents/strengths
- Then lead onto discussing *qualities*. Try to make them think about being kind, loving, caring, honest, unselfish, fair, forgiving, friendly, etc.
- Ask them to give examples ... Ask open questions like "Can you think of how we can be honest? Can you think of a time when you were kind to someone?
- Encourage them to fill in the empty stars and colour them in.

2 "My Baptism" worksheet 15 minutes approx.

Talk to the children about baptism being the start of their faith journey when they became part of God's Christian family, the Church.

Tell them that we dip our hand into water (in a stoup) and make the sign of the cross when we enter a church - to remember our baptism as we were baptised in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Take this opportunity to practise making the sign of the cross.

Do it together and then ask for volunteers to do it individually.

Ask if anyone has been to a baptism and talk about it.

Tell them what happened at their own baptism (if they were babies they will not remember). Ask them to fill in their own baptism details on the page. You should ask them to take the booklet home and discuss the questions with their parents.

3 "Remembering My Baptism " worksheet 20 minutes approx.

Go through each symbol and explain what it is and what it means:

<u>Water</u>: symbol of life and cleansing – in baptism we are completely cleansed and begin a new life with Christ in God's family.

<u>Oil</u>: in baptism we are anointed with the oil of chrism and the oil of catechumens (to help us turn away from sin towards good).

<u>Candle</u>: at baptism the godparent is given your baptism candle which is lit from the large paschal candle on the altar, a symbol of passing on the light of Christ (Jesus is the Light of the World - shows us the right way) to the child.

<u>Shawl</u>: at baptism the child "puts on Christ" - the shawl is a symbol of the child being completely enveloped/wrapped in the love of Christ. The shawl is white as a sign of purity.

<u>Font:</u> In Jesus' time, people were baptised in a river. The font is a smaller and more practical version! (There is more symbolism re. the font and entering/emerging from the tomb).

4 "My Second Sacrament"

15 minutes approx.

An information worksheet explaining what the Sacrament of Reconciliation is about. Highlight the fact that this is their second sacrament and that they are moving on to the next stage of their faith journey; compare it to moving on from one primary school class/stage to another.

Tell them that they are getting bigger and are now able to know right from wrong, and that this sacrament will help them to get even better at recognising right from wrong. Take care to highlight the goodness in the children and the fact that we all make mistakes - everyone sins - even grown-ups, teachers, parents, priests, the Pope - but we are loved unconditionally (explain this word) and forgiven by Christ. The quotations (Ephesians 4:32, Matthew 6, 9-13, John 20:23) can help to let the children know that the bible shows many examples of forgiveness and that Sacrament of Reconciliation came from Christ himself when he commissioned his disciples to forgive sins on his behalf (after the resurrection). This same power is given to priests to act in persona Christi - in the person of Christ (this comes up in a later booklet but you could mention it here too). Tell them that it is still God who forgives sins.

You could mention the other names used for the sacrament here - Penance, Confession.

5 "I Belong"

15 mins approx.

This worksheet summarises previous ones and reinforces the idea of belonging to the Christian family of God and a parish. You should underline the importance of going to Mass to worship together as one big Christian family community. You could discuss other aspects of the Church which make people feel that they belong: parish events, parish and school community events, becoming altar servers, etc. Ask them to fill in the blanks on the sheet.

6 "Prayers to Learn and Say Every Day" 10 minutes approx.

Take time to read through the three prayers with the children. Some might already know them but some will need help to practise. Giving these out in the first session gives them more time to practise them at home. Ask the children to say the three prayers at home every day with an adult if they can.

You could also give out a copy of whichever Act of Sorrow/ Contrition you intend the children to learn. Taking it home at this early stage allows them to practise it at home.
